

Exit Glacier (fee area)

Exit Glacier is the most accessible park area. The turnoff at mile 3.7 of the Seward Highway leads nine miles on paved road to the Exit Glacier Ranger Station. Exhibits about the glacier and the Harding Icefield, interpretive programs, and hikes are available here. Rangers provide information daily in summer.

An easy half-mile walk leads to the glacier's terminus; the first quarter mile is fully accessible. A steeper trail continues over moraines and bedrock. You can return to the

ranger station by a self-guiding nature trail. Exit Glacier descends 2,500 feet over its nearly three-mile length. Stay off the ice; the glacier is active, and calving ice is dangerous. The area beyond the warning signs is strictly off limits.

Harding Icefield Trail (3.9 miles one way; day use only, no overnight camping along trail) follows the glacier's flank to an overlook of the icefield. Check bulletin boards for trail conditions; heavy rains may result in trail closure.



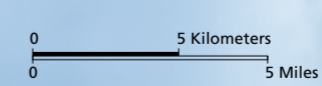
